### Journey to Excellence Program

By now all units should be briefed by their UC on the new program and be working toward their goals. This is especially important as some unit requirements must be met early in the year. I and the ADCs will start spot-checking units in Mar-May and we will do an additional check at the Program Launch at the May Roundtable.

### Unit Visitation Tracking System

Just a reminder that all commissioners must be entering their contacts with units into the Unit Visit Tracking System. If anyone is still having problems getting into the system contact me and I'll work with our District Executive to get you in. In the meantime, your ADC can enter the visit for you, or just save the information and enter it when you do have access. The gold standard for unit visits for District JTE purposes is for 50% of our units to have 6 or more contacts entered into the system over the course of the year. The Old Dominion goal should be for 100% of our units to have no less than 12 contacts entered (one contact per month).



### Exploring Program being moved into Districts

Exploring is an alternative program for older youth. It is similar to Venturing but career/vocation-oriented. Until recently it was part of the BSA-associated program "Learning for Life" but now will be organized more closely with the district organization. Some key points: (1) There are currently no Explorer posts in Old Dominion, but we will be seeking to stand up at least one this year. (2) We do not have to provide commissioners for these units – there will be a separate exploring committee that works with the district committee to serve the units. (3) If you have interest in getting involved with the district explorer program let me know.

### Commissioner Support to Spring Camporee

This event is coming fast. As a reminder, we will be providing expanded commissioner support and need all hands on deck. Support activities include: parking and unit welcome/orientation Fri night, registration support (need 3), campsite inspections, general support at various locations Saturday. Please let me know if you can make it, along with timeframes of availability.

### Chartered Organization Representatives (COR) – commissioner responsibilities

Commissioners should: (1) know who their unit COR is (2) encourage them to take training (3) encourage them to attend district committee meetings, especially the annual business meeting where they have a vote. I sent a new unit contact list recently with a COR column – please let me know the information for your units.

## CHAIRMAN'S NOTES



I have a wonderful story to share with you this month. I heard this directly from the mouth of an eight old Wolf Scout while I was waiting to make an FOS pitch at one of our local packs. In the six years that I have been giving FOS pitches, I don't think I ever had a better opening act to follow. The Cubmaster of the pack was kind enough to forward me the parents written account so that I may be able to share it with you.

"In a local mall, J.J., a Bear scout, was pushing his 2-year-old sister in a stroller. The two got separated from their parents within a store for a few moments. Near the front entrance of the store, a man approached the children and did not speak any words. The man grabbed J.J. by the wrist and pulled on him, then forced J.J. to shake hands with him. The man did the same to his sister.

J.J. told us that he got a bad feeling about this man and immediately turned and ran with his sister to the back of the store to find his parents. Luckily, everyone was reunited without anyone getting hurt. This could have been a catastrophe. When asked how he knew to run away, J.J. reported that it was from reading Boys Life magazine especially the young heroes section and from the training he had in den meetings regarding strangers."

We have all read stories like this in our local papers. However, they usually don't have the same positive outcome that JJ and sisters did. His is a true testament to the value of scouting in the lives of the youth we serve. I encourage you to pass along JJ's story, when asked, "Why do you give to scouting?" You can answer that you give not only to make a difference, but because sometimes, just sometimes, it also saves a life!

The Old Dominion District congratulates our own, 2011 Class of Silver Beavers recipient, Steve Richardson! Steve was bestowed this award on Thursday April 7, at the National Capital Area Council 2011 Court of Honor and Silver Beaver Award Presentation at the Fairview Park Marriot in Falls Church.

The Silver Beaver is awarded by the National Council, Boy Scouts of America, upon the recommendation of the local council. It is the highest honor an adult Scouter may receive through local council and is given for service in three equal categories: service to community, service to youth involved in scouting and service to youth outside of scouting. Approximately one in every 1,000 volunteers is so honored.

### Spring 2011 Old Dominion District Unit Membership Growth Goals

When you were a teen, your dad said to you: "You're never going to get anywhere in life without setting and reaching goals." Well, maybe not EXACTLY that—but surely something like it. Well, we are setting goals for unit growth through Spring Roundup this year. These goals won't be used to judge—they are meant to be used as a challenge and target.

Now—here are our ODD unit membership growth goals for Spring 2011:

- For Cub Scout packs—20% growth
- For Boy Scout troops and Venturing crews—10% growth

Growth will be measured from the end of April membership figures.

OK—let's put this in perspective—20% growth for a pack of 30 Cub Scouts is 6 new Cub Scouts. Hey—that's your new TIGER DEN! 10% growth for a troop of 30 Boy Scouts is 3 new Boy Scouts. If you work with your pack and recruit this year's 5th graders, this should be easy pickings!

## GEAR UP FOR LEADERSHIP AT ROUNDTABLE

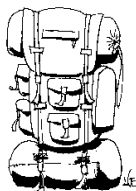

## LOGGING COMMUNITY SERVICE HOURS

Units can now enter their service hours at: [www.scouting.org/awards/journeytoexcellence](http://www.scouting.org/awards/journeytoexcellence). Look for the “Service Project” area of the screen. There they can find the link to log hours, information for first time users, ideas and tips for a successful service project, and sample reports that can be pulled by their council administrator. To enter service hours click on “service hours website.” Choose “New User Click Here” or enter in the existing username and password. Users can still use [www.goodturnforamerica.com](http://www.goodturnforamerica.com) and they will be redirected to the new data collection site. If you have any questions, please contact the national service desk at 1-972-580-2267.

As a reminder to those who are closely following the new Journey to Excellence (JTE) program, community service hours are measured and tracked for the Council’s JTE scorecard item #11. The details on how the Community Service Hours metric is measured are as follows: This measurement tracks the total service hours by Scouts, leaders, and other participants recorded on the Journey to Excellence service hours website divided by the total traditional members and Explorers. The determined standard is pro-rated according to the total number of months elapsed in the year. The performance standard is a factor in how a council's score may be decided.

[www.ole.scouting.org](http://www.ole.scouting.org) and

can be completed in short sessions. Need more advanced training? Check out the Council website for available courses, information and online registration. Go to [www.boyscouts-ncac.org](http://www.boyscouts-ncac.org) and click on the training tab. Click on the training calendar. There you will find a drop down menu for the different districts in the council and what training they are offering each month. Clicking on the training will give you more information about the session and how to register.

For online training you will need your id number provided on your registration card from BSA if you have one, if not you can take the training and then add your number to your profile when you receive it.

**All registered adults must have youth protection training** including newly registered adults, their YPT card must be attached to their registration form or the registration form will not be accepted by Council. For Charter Renewal this year all unit leaders like Scoutmasters, Assistant Scoutmasters, Cub masters, Assistant Cub masters, Den Leaders, Assistant Den Leaders as well as all committee members must be fully trained in their position to continue in those positions.

### Wood Badge Training May 5-8 #1, June 10-12 #2

Wood Badge for the 21st Century is designed for all Cub, Scout, and Varsity and Venturing leaders who have completed basic training. It is a leadership skills course, based on a format originally created by Scouting's Founder, Lord Robert Baden Powell and is considered the "Ph.D." of Scout training. The course is held over three days over two weekends about a month apart. Participants are required to attend each weekend in its entirety, including all day on Friday (arriving by 8:00 AM). Held at Camp Snyder in Haymarket, VA.

The course will deal with cutting edge leadership and management skills while using a structure built on Scouting's organization and unit program. More information and registration info can be obtained from the council website ([www.boyscouts-ncac.org](http://www.boyscouts-ncac.org)). Click on "Training" and then "Wood Badge" to get the data and forms to download.

**Youth Protection Training (YPT)** – Re-certification is mandatory at least once every two years. This course is required to register as a Scouter.

**Youth Protection Training For Venture Leaders**– Re-certification is mandatory at least once every two years. This is a different class for Venturing leaders which addresses special considerations for older age youth, and coed units.

**This is Scouting** – is the entry-level course required for all Scout leader training.

**Cub Scout Leader Position Specific Training (CSLT)** – covers all Cub Scout leader positions.

**Chartered Organization Representative Training (COR)** – This Is Scouting is not a prerequisite for COR Training but is recommended for CORs not familiar with the Scouting program. Fast start for CORs is available online.

**Troop Committee Challenge (TCC)** – covers all Troop Committee positions

**Supplemental Training Modules** – are designed to provide orientation beyond the basic training

## DISTRICT AWARD OF MERIT RECIPIENTS

**Mike Kidd** started Cub Scouts in 1962 and stayed involved in Scouting for the next 10 years attending the 1969 National Jamboree, earning Eagle Scout with a Silver Palm, and becoming a Brotherhood member of the OA. After a long absence from Scouting, which was only broken by the opportunity to serve as a Philmont Ranger while in college, Mike's adult involvement began when his son joined Cub Scouts in Hawaii. Mike's first camping trip in the Old Dominion District was with his son's Webelos Den (Pack 88) at the District's Fall Camporee, Sky Meadows State Park, Oct 6-7, 2000. His second O.D.D. camping trip was the District's Spring Camporee at Harpers Ferry, April 20-22, 2001—ten years ago—and he hasn't missed a Spring Camporee since.

On all of those camporees, if he wasn't in charge of Troop 688's new Scout program, he was working on the camporee's staff. He has taught Space Exploration MB at every single O.D.D Merit Badge Jamboree, worked as a counselor at the Merit Badge Midways of the 2005 and 2010 National Jamborees, was lead advisor at a Philmont crew, and participated in a Northern Tier trek. At last year's Centennial Camporee, Mike ran the orienteering and hiking part of the New Scout Adventure. After seven years as an active Assistant Scoutmaster, Mike became (and still is) Troop 688's Committee Chair. Mike was awarded O.D.D.'s Key 6 Award in 2008. In the community he has served as science fair judge for Lee High School, Christian Academy, and Shepard School (DC). He has been a part of the Lee band Parents Association, cooking those wonderful hot-dogs for the games 1983-87. Lee was an Assistant Coach in the

Springfield Little league from 1983-87. He has been married since 1967 and has two sons, one of whom has achieved Eagle Rank. Currently Lee is retired after 34 years at Walter Reed Institute of Research as a research chemist in the combat casualty group, concentrating on Hemorrhagic Shock.

**Tom Quigley** had a big scouting resume in 2010-11, when he has served on the District Finance team, planned and implemented the entire Brownsea program at the Centennial Camporee, and organized and chartered a new Venture Crew, as well as serving on the staff at the National Jamboree. His district resume includes merit badge instructor and District Vice Chairman for Finance. Since joining Troop 688 he has led and been a part of numerous outings including high adventure trips to Philmont and winter camping at Northern Tier in Minnesota.

Tom organized and co-chartered Venture Crew 610 in September 2010 and currently serves as its Advisor. He has been recognized as an Outstanding Assistant Scoutmaster, received the Key 6 Award, was presented the Bronze Pelican Award for support to Catholic Scouting and is a Brotherhood member of the Order of the Arrow. In the community he helps officiate at youth football and lacrosse games.

**Derek Trumbetic** has been a key volunteer for the Old Dominion District for over thirteen years. He has served as a volunteer at the unit, district and council levels. Attendance at this event will also satisfy partial completion towards the International Activities Patch for both Scouts and Scouters and also satisfy some requirements for the International Scouter's Award for Scouters.

Please note that attendance is not limited to those trekking to Sweden for the World Jamboree – any Boy Scout or Venture Scout may register for the event and attend. ## DAVIS RECEIVES HORNADAY GOLD BADGE

On February 21, 2011, National Capital Area Council President Dan McCarthy and Scout Executive Les Baron signed the certificate to award the Hornaday Gold Badge to Kenneth P. Davis, of Old Dominion District and council Executive Board member, based on his service during the period 2005-2008 on the Order of the Arrow's "ArrowCorps5" conservation projects.

The ArrowCorps5 projects were carried out in five national forests in 2008 in California, Missouri, Utah, Virginia and Wyoming. Scouter Davis served as the Transportation Unit Leader for the 750 OA members involved at Goshen Scout Camps in Virginia, supporting trail projects in the George Washington/Jefferson National Forest near the camp, carried out in June 2008. Later, in late July and early August, he served as the Logistics Section Chief for the entire project at the Bridger-Teton National Forest in Jackson, Wyoming. In this role, he was one of the four major staff officers reporting to the Incident Commander, providing all logistics support needed for the project. This project involved 1100 OA members building trails, dealing with invasive species and removing fencing that inhibited wildlife movement. Davis directed a staff of 55 to support daily movement of 600 workers and which also supported the deployment and recovery of two "spike" camps of 150 workers each who worked in remote locations for the week of the project.

The US Forest Service, an agency of the US Department of Agriculture, estimated that the OA provided some 280,000 man-hours of work at all five projects, valued at \$5.6 million worth of service. These figures average out to 58,334 man-hours and \$1,166,667 in Virginia. For the Wyoming project, the man-hour figures work out to 85,555 and the dollar value is \$1,711,111.

Davis was among the early staff members of the ArrowCorps5 project, taking training in early 2006 and investing some one thousand man-hours and two on-site visits to the Virginia project and five on-site visits to the Wyoming project.

The William T. Hornaday Conservation Gold Badge can be awarded to adult Scouters who have given significant service to the field of conservation at or above the council level for a period of at least three years. The recipient is authorized to wear a gold badge on his uniform above the left pocket.

Davis is a Scouter of 56+ years who has worked extensively in the Order of the Arrow and training/Wood Badge levels for more than 30 years.
